A NUMBER

Numbers and data help us see human trafficking more clearly. For an issue that is often ignored or misunderstood, these numbers help us understand who we serve and the comprehensive services survivors need to reclaim their lives after exploitation. However, they're only part of the story.

REFUGE

For Katie^{*}, these nights of safety opened the door to longterm sobriety. Because she was safe and surrounded by community, Katie focused on her sobriety. What started as one day became a week, which grew to a month, which is becoming a lifestyle. Katie is celebrating milestones in her sobriety and learning how to feel safe in new ways.

INTENSIVE OUTPATIENT PROGRAM


There is so much ground to cover on a healing journey. And for many survivors of human trafficking, it can be difficult to know where to even begin. Participants in AncoraTN's Aftercare Program often carry complex trauma—a term used to describe how systemic hardships and independent, negative life experiences can mix together to create emotional, mental, social, and physical harm that must be addressed holistically, over time. By providing support services with a comprehensive view of a survivor's various traumas over a longer span of time, AncoraTN hopes to build a foundation for sustainable health and independence.

In 2022, AncoraTN developed and implemented trafficking-specific intensive outpatient treatment programming, offering a roadmap for survivors as they build hope and seek a brighter future. AncoraTN's on-site therapeutic program was designed to meet the needs and address the complex traumas that survivors of human trafficking face. Over the course of 12 weeks, residents at AncoraTN's Survivor Restoration Campus and survivors who live throughout Middle Tennessee gather to cover hard topics like identity, safety, boundaries, relationships, and much more. Meetings are facilitated by AncoraTN's highly skilled and deeply passionate direct services staff in a trauma-informed and therapeutic environment.

WHAT IS HUMAN TRAFFICKING?

Human trafficking is the **exploitation** of humans for purposes such as sexual and labor servitude where something of value is exchanged (money, food, housing, drugs, etc.) through the means of **force, fraud or coercion.**

For minors under 18, force, fraud or coercion does not need to be present.

APPROACH

AncoraTN works tirelessly to nurture survivor healing and strategically combat human trafficking in Tennessee. We seek to break cycles of exploitation and support survivors of human trafficking as they heal from their traumas—offering long-term, comprehensive aftercare services. Through educating communities and professionals, advocating for changes in legislation, and implementing prevention programming, AncoraTN works to stop human trafficking before it ever begins.

As experts in the field, we train over 30,000 professionals and community members each year. We equip front-line professionals to identify human trafficking victims and positively impact those within their spheres of influence.

We provide human trafficking survivors with long-term, comprehensive, specialized, traumainformed aftercare through residential and community-based services.

We work successfully at local, state, and national levels to foster strategic collaboration, effective communication, and meaningful legislation with the goal of accomplishing systemic change.

We work to prevent this crime through building safe relationships with youth who are at high-risk of being exploited via a 4-week interactive curriculum, specialized group facilitation, and equipping our community with resources.

In 2022, AncoraTN provided aftercare, training, advocacy, or prevention programming in all 41 counties in Middle Tennessee.





The Tennessee Counter-Trafficking Alliance, formerly known as the Tennessee Anti-Slavery Alliance, was formed in 2016, when Grow Free Tennessee (upper East Tennessee), AncoraTN (Middle Tennessee), and Restore Corps (West Tennessee) received requests from state-level officials to expand their services and their service regions so that every county, community, and city in the state of Tennessee would have access to an organization addressing community-specific needs with regard to human trafficking.

2022 ACHIEVEMENTS

SURVIVOR HIGHLIGHTS



AGENCY MILESTONES

2022 was a monumental year for AncoraTN. Entering a new chapter, AncoraTN laid the foundation for transformational survivor care for years to come.

JANUARY

For the first time, AncoraTN has a full-time, inhouse trauma therapist enhancing the clinical component of aftercare programming.

JANUARY - AUGUST

Renovations are made to the main structure on the Survivor Restoration Campus.

SEPTEMBER

The Survivor Restoration Campus opens its doors as staff move on-site and the first survivors begin receiving services.

OCTOBER


The first residents move into the Survivor Restoration Campus.

Kelli Cary joins AncoraTN as the agency's third CEO.



LEGISLATIVE VICTORIES

In 2022, AncoraTN successfully advocated for 10 new laws in the state of Tennessee. These laws promote protections and services for survivors of human trafficking, paired with harsher punishments for their traffickers.

- Public Chapters 677, 1027, & 1033 all open significant doors for survivors with criminal records to have their records expunged. These laws pave a smoother path for survivors to find living-wage employment and sustainable housing.
- Public Chapter 1015 requires a new designation on TN driver's licenses or photo IDs that will make individuals who have been convicted of human trafficking more easily identifiable to law enforcement.
- Public Chapter 1021 expands requirements for AncoraTN's trafficking module trainings from TN educators to all school staff members in the state.
- Public Chapter 1115 strengthens numerous existing state laws around trafficking, including officially prohibiting the prosecution of victims of trafficking for the offense of prostitution under the age of 18.
