KIARA'S **S T O R Y**

Kiara's trafficking began when she was 15years-old. A history of childhood sexual abuse from family members made her the target of a man looking to exploit the pain of a vulnerable child.

This man groomed Kiara – a tactic employed by traffickers to train and prepare a victim to be sold for sex. He gained Kiara's trust, bought her gifts, told her she was special and let her spend the night when she didn't want to return home. He started to isolate Kiara from friends. He bought her a cell phone, but controlled who she contacted.

Her childhood trauma distorted her views of sex and love. Believing this man to be her boyfriend, Kiara thought these control tactics were evidence of deep love. Kiara felt she owed him for everything he did for her. He put an advertisement online and sold her for sex in and out of motel rooms for several years.

Kiara was identified by law enforcement officers when she was 19 and referred to End Slavery Tennessee's (ESTN) holistic aftercare services. She has complex-PSTD from her trafficking history and childhood trauma. She struggles with low selfesteem, depression and anxiety. Kiara also used drugs while she was being trafficked to numb the pain and survive the trauma she was experiencing. She had a trauma bond with her trafficker – a strong emotional attachment between an abused person and their abuser, formed as a result of the cycle of violence and confused by distorted views of self and body.

At ESTN, Kiara worked with a trained Care Coordinator receiving comprehensive, trauma-informed aftercare specific to her individual needs and personal goals. Kiara's Care Coordinator advocated for her to receive benefits from the victim compensation fund and procured a laptop for Kiara amidst COVID-19 to help her with virtual learning.

Kiara loved hearing stories of other survivors, so her Care Coordinator connected her with an alumni survivor, mentor and brought her books about trafficking.

Every day that Kiara faced the trauma of her past, she proves her strength and courage for her future. Kiara's story is far from over, but because of the support of a generous community, Kiara is on the road to healing and restoration.

SURVIVOR STORY •

WHAT IS HUMAN TRAFFICKING?

Human trafficking is the exploitation of humans for purposes such as sexual and labor servitude.

It is also known as **modern-day slavery**.



PHYSICAL

- Has injuries or other signs of abuse and is reluctant to explain them.
- Appears malnourished.
- Branded or marked with a tattoo, such as a man's name, symbol of money or a barcode.
- Dressed in a provocative manner or in the same clothes, regardless of weather or circumstance.

POSSESSIONS

- Has very few personal possessions.
- Has an unexplained, sudden increase in money, clothing or possessions like jewelry without explanation.
- Doesn't carry identification.
- Has a number of hotel keys or key cards.
- Has a prepaid cell phone.

BEHAVIOR

- Fears authority figures.
- Claims to be an adult, though their appearance suggests adolescence.
- Seems to move frequently from place to place.
- Talks about an older boyfriend or sex with an older man.
- Has inconsistencies in their story.
- Claims to be visiting, and can't state what city they're in or for how long.
- Isn't able to speak for themselves.
- Has sexually explicit profiles on social networking sites.
- Is not enrolled in school or is consistently absent.
- Seems to be withdrawn, depressed, or "checked out."

LACK OF CONTROL

- Accompanied by someone who seems to control their every move.
- Seems scripted in the way they speak.
- Doesn't have control over their own money.
- Can't come and go from place to place on their own.

OUR **A P P R O A C H**









End Slavery Tennessee provides specialized case management and comprehensive aftercare for trafficking survivors and tactically addresses the problem through advocacy, prevention and training of front-line professionals.

As experts in the field, we train over 20,000 professionals and community members each year. We equip first responders to identify human trafficking victims and broaden their sphere of influence in their field.

We provide human trafficking survivors long term, comprehensive, specialized, trauma-informed aftercare through both in-house services and other community service providers.

We work successfully on the local, state and national levels to create effective collaboration and communication, accomplishing systemic change and influencing policy and laws.

We facilitate specialized groups to keep vulnerable youth safer, address the demand through interactive curriculum and equip the general population through innovative strategies and resources to prevent exploitation.

DIRECT SERVICES STAFF SPOTLIGHT JULIA ROTUNNO

Julia started with End Slavery Tennessee as the Transportation Coordinator in December 2019, ensuring safe transport to essential appointments for clients in our program. Because of her leadership, she quickly advanced to the role of Community Response Specialist where she leads the robust support group program and facilitates prevention curriculum to highrisk youth populations.

Since her promotion in May, Julia has redefined support groups, transitioning most to a virtual platform per COVID-19 health and safety precautions. Collaborating with community partners, Julia built, transformed, and supported the curriculum for 18 virtual groups, using evidence-based principles.

Julia's innovation and dedication has been pivotal in equipping survivors with positive coping strategies and life skills to heal from past trauma. Support groups provide a sense of community and understanding while empowering survivors to work toward independent, healthy living.

Julia continues to sharpen her skills and is currently pursuing a Master of Clinical Mental Health Counseling at Trevecca Nazarene University.

SURVIVOR AFTERCARE

End Slavery Tennessee's (ESTN) Safe House and Care Center are where survivors in our Aftercare Program spend most of their time. The locations and environment of each building take into account trauma-informed principles. Intentionally structured with multiple exits, lots of light and peaceful décor, survivor comfort and safety are top priority.





SAFE HOUSE

Ohana ("family" in Hawaiian) is the name of ESTN's safe house. Its confidential location ensures survivors are free from trafficker retaliation. Residential clients typically live in the safe house for 6 months prior to transitioning to independent living.

With strengths-based oversight and traumainformed support from ESTN's Resident Manager, survivors learn the basic life skills of home and health management, practice conflict resolution and form peer support systems in a structured and safe environment.



CARE CENTER

ESTN's Care Center is where residential and community clients come together for daily programming. Survivors attend therapy, meet with Care Coordinators, participate in classes and support groups and socialize with staff and other survivors.

Small business partners often allow survivors to work part time jobs from the safety of the Care Center and law enforcement interviews are conducted there to maintain a level of comfort for clients.




In 2020, End Slavery Tennessee (ESTN) provided aftercare, training, advocacy or prevention programming in all 41 counties in Middle Tennessee.



TENNESSEE ANTI-Slavery Alliance

The Tennessee Anti-Slavery Alliance was formed in 2016, when Grow Free Tennessee (upper East Tennessee), End Slavery Tennessee (Middle Tennessee), and Restore Corps (West Tennessee) received requests from state-level officials to expand their services as well as their service regions so that every county, community, and city in the state of Tennessee would have access to an organization addressing community-specific needs with regard to human trafficking.



^{*}The numbers on these graphs represent the survivors who self-indentify their demographics.


